WIN Network is expanding! Group prenatal care is coming to Dearborn

WIN Network: Detroit is excited to announce that Henry Ford Health System Women's Health has been chosen as the recipient of this year's "Hillman Innovations in Care" funding award from the Rita and Alex Hillman Foundation, which will allow WIN Network: Detroit to not only continue operating our group prenatal care program in partnership with Henry Ford Women's Health for the next 3 years, but will also allow us to expand our reach to Dearborn, Michigan. This award is given to organizations demonstrating innovation in the nursing field. In the past two years, the Innovations in Care award has been awarded to two recipients each year, however, this year our project was the sole winner of this grant funding.



Starting spring 2019, we will begin to hold group prenatal care at the <u>Henry Ford Medical Center - Ford</u> <u>Road.</u> We will continue to focus on serving African American women aged 18-45 to reduce the disparities in infant mortality that exist in the Dearborn community.

Henry Ford Women's Health Certified Nurse Midwife, Danielle Track, will serve our Dearborn group prenatal care participants, along with our Community Health Workers - Linda, Nada, and Felicia.

We've been hard at work to expand our program to this new location and reach a new population of mothers and families! If you or someone you know is interested in joining group prenatal care during their pregnancy, call 313-916-8999.

One Key Question® comes to Detroit to change the way we talk about family planning

On January 30th, <u>Power to Decide</u> visited Metro Detroit to hold a One Key Question provider training in Farmington Hills. One Key Question is a family planning initiative that seeks to ask women in their interactions at many points with the healthcare system, "Would you like to be pregnant in the next year?"

One Key Question is a patient-centered, non-judgmental way for providers to have conversations about pregnancy, personal goals and desires, birth control, methods, and family planning with patients. The Detroit Regional Infant Mortality Reduction Task Force and March of Dimes have partnered to bring One Key Question to many Detroit organizations including health systems, health departments, nonprofits, home visitors, and more. One Key Question is an innovative way for the Task Force to address infant mortality, by increasing the number of births which moms are prepared for, allowing them the time to ensure they are in good health before pregnancy.

At WIN Network: Detroit, we will use One Key Question during our home visits with group prenatal care moms. Community Health Workers will ask moms during post-natal one-on-one visits this question and spark open and honest conversations about plans for future children, birth control methods, and preparing to expand mom's family further!

Group Prenatal Care: By The Numbers

154 babies have been born in WIN Network's group prenatal care program.

6.76 lbs is the babies' average birthweight.

39.3 weeks is the average gestational age.

92% of moms initiated breastfeeding.

130 fathers attended at least one session.


